WALTERS ART GALLERY. Charles and Centre Streets. Open 11 to 5. Some seventy-five watercolors and drawings by Gavarni, the majority from the Walters collection, largest in any public institution, others from George A. Lucas collection and the National Gallery of Art, Washington. Exhibition given in honor of Professor Paul J. Sachs' seventieth birthday.

Permanent installation of the Gallery's Mesopotamian collection, recently completed.

MARYLAND HISTORICAL SOCIETY. 201 W. Monument Street. Open 9 to 5. Saturdays 9 to 4.

Architectural drawings from the Society's collection, including the competetive drawings of 1791 for the United States Capital by Jefferson, MacIntire, Hoban and others.

MUNICIPAL (PEALE) MUSEUM. 225 N. Holliday Street. Open Thursday and Friday, 11 to 5.

First public exhibition of paintings by Philip Tilyard (1785-1830), self-taught Baltimore artist, "an honest and unfortunate man of genius."

GOUCHER COLLEGE, Goucher Hall, St. Paul and 23rd Streets. Open 9 to 5.

Two books illustrated by Matisse, lent by the Cone Collection: Les poésies de Stephan Mallarmé, with selections from the preliminary drawings, trial proofs and scored plates; and JAZZ, written by the artist.

THE JOHNS HOPKINS UNIVERSITY, Gilman Hall, Charles and 34th Streets. Open 9 to 5.

Mendes I. Cohen collection of Egyptian antiquities, believed the first such private collection to be brought to the United States.

JOHN W. GARRETT LIBRARY. 4545 N. Charles Street. Open 2 to 5 on one day January 27th to 29th, whenever a group is arranged for a visit.

Illustrated books of the 16th and 17th centuries. Theatre with Bakst's decorations.

PEABODY INSTITUTE LIBRARY. 1 East Mt. Vernon Place. Open 9 to 5. 235,000 volumes. Important reference library for history, literature and art.

WELCH MEDICAL LIBRARY (Johns Hopkins Medical School). 1900 East Monument Street. Possesses a good collection of works on art as related to medicine and anatomy, particularly regarding Leonardo.

ENOCH PRATT FREE LIBRARY. Cathedral and Franklin Streets. Open 9 to 9. One of the country's outstanding public libraries. Art department on second floor.

ANNAPOLIS, MARYLAND.

Hammond-Harwood House, built in 1770 and one of the outstanding examples of Colonial American architecture, is now open to the public after its recent redecoration and refurnishing from contemporary sources. Open 10 to 4, Sundays 1 to 4. Admission 50c.

Chase House (opposite), dating from the late 18th Century, open 9 to 12 and 2 to 5. Admission 25c.

Old State Treasury Building, late 17th Century, now Civic Information Bureau, on the Capital grounds, open 9 to 5, daily.
